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ABOUT US

Established in 2014, Moawin Foundation (MF) is a registered not-for-profit organization (NPO) Operating under section 42 of the companies Act 2017, holds the status of an approved NPO under section 2(36) of the income tax ordinance, 2001, and has signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) With the Economic Affairs Division of the Government of Pakistan, enabling it to receive funding from international donors. In December 2023, MF was also registered as a Charity in the United Kingdom. It's worth mentioning here that Moawin Foundation's Zakat collection process is fully Shariah compliant Our procedures have been carefully reviewed by a qualified Shariah Advisor, who has certified our processes for both collection and disbursement.



We place a strong emphasis on primary and secondary education, as it serves as the foundational stage for students to build their futures. Our approach focuses on integrating educational technology, digital learning, and modern teaching techniques, such as storytelling and spelling bee, to enhance the learning experience. Additionally, we prioritize life skills education, along with health and hygiene, as well as moral and ethical training, to nurture students into responsible, positive contributors to the society



To achieve these goals, Moawin Foundation currently supports 286 schools nationwide, including 150 Punjab Education Foundation (PEF) schools in the districts of Attock & Chakwal in Punjab, under the Public School Reorganization Program (PSRP) initiated by the Government of Punjab as well as four schools under the Sindh Education Foundation (SEF). Our interventions have led to increased enrollment of out-of-school children and improvements in educational standards across these schools. In parallel, we have established eight Vocational Training Institutes (VTIs) across Pakistan, which are offering wide range of courses.

So far, Moawin Foundation has made significant strides in education and skill development. As of December 2024, we are trying to provide good quality education to more than 43,000 students enrolled in 286 schools across Pakistan. In the realm of vocational training, we have equipped more than 2,300 youth with essential skills for the workforce

Moawin Foundation, founded in 2014 by Admiral (Retd) Muhammad Asif Sandila, former Chief of Naval Staff, is a non-profit organization dedicated to transforming marginalized and vulnerable rural communities in Pakistan through its Educate-Train-Empower concept. By adopting schools and providing skill development training to youth and women, we aim to deliver quality education and generate household-level impact. Moawin Foundation is registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) under Section 42 of the Companies Act 2017, certified by the Pakistan Centre for Philanthropy (PCP), and tax-exempt by the Federal Board of Revenue (FBR), Government of Pakistan.

Method of utilization of Zakat:

The organization's financial needs are being covered by Zakat that individuals and corporates from Pakistan and throughout the world contribute towards. Zakat received by Moawin Foundation is spent on the benefits of deserving persons. Moawin Foundation's management checks out the financial condition of applicants in respect of Zakat eligibility and gets zakat agency from the eligible for the organization. This agency results in tamleek (ownership) of Zakat for the benefit of Zakat eligible persons which enables Moawin Foundation to collect Zakat on their behalf and utilize it as per eligible needs of beneficiaries.

Shariah Ruling:

To ensure the Shariah compliance of whole zakat process in true spirit, the undersigned has been appointed as an independent Zakat Consultant to review all Zakat-related documents and procedures. I have designed the complete Zakat SOP, policies, procedures and later monitored the implementation phase. After conducting the review exercise, it is hereby certified that Moawin Foundation collects and utilizes Zakat funds as per Shariah requirements. It is also confirmed that whosoever will give Zakat to this organization; his/her Zakat will be paid as per Shariah. 
FROM 2014 TO 2024

A Journey of Transformation: From Humble Beginnings to a Visionary Success

MF was registered in Oct 2014, later in 2015 three childhood friends Admiral Asif Sandila (Retd), Air Commodore Naser Ali Hamdani (Retd), and former Federal Secretary Hamid Ali Khan embarked on a mission that would change the future of thousands of children. Inspired by Admiral Asif's own experiences growing up in a small village of Mamun wali, district Sheikhpura, the trio committed to improving access to quality education.

The journey commenced with the adoption of two government schools, both facing significant challenges. One was a girls' middle school with strength of 142 female students, the other was a boys' high school with 180 students struggling to provide quality education. The absence of proper washrooms and access to clean drinking water further discouraged parents from sending their children to these schools, highlighting the urgent need for interventions. But with determination and a clear vision, Moawin Foundation set out to transform these schools into thriving centers of learning. MF focused on teachers training, filling infrastructural gaps: clean water facilities, repaired washrooms, additional classrooms, solar systems for power, and the integration of Ed Tech facilities. Establishing Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) classrooms further enhanced the schools' offerings, turning them into model institutions. These efforts led to increased enrollment and the upgradation of schools.

What began as an initiative to provide basic education soon blossomed into something much greater , 286 schools, over 43,000 students, and a lasting legacy of change. The Moawin Foundation's journey is a testament to the power of determination, collaboration, and a shared vision to make quality education accessible to all.

PROGRAMME UPDATE & HUMAN IMPACT STORIES

At Moawin Foundation, we believe that gender equality and women's empowerment are essential for success. Alongside quality education, they form the foundation for a brighter future. This year, our education program saw significant engagement with strategic partners to enhance quality education and strengthen teacher capacity building.



E-LEARNING

SABAQ FOUNDATION

E-learning has significantly enhanced the teaching and learning experience by making education more engaging, effective, and interactive. Within school premises, it provides teachers with innovative tools to deliver lessons more efficiently, improving instructional quality and student engagement. By integrating technology, e-learning helps teachers simplify complex concepts, track student progress, and adapt teaching strategies based on real-time feedback. As part of its commitment to enhancing e-learning, Moawin Foundation, in collaboration with Sabaq Foundation, is advancing e-learning integration to enhance educational outcomes.

This initiative is being implemented across 45 schools, benefiting around 125 teachers and impacting more than 2,000 students. By leveraging technology-driven solutions.

It strengthens conceptual understanding, enhances academic performance, and promotes a more dynamic and effective learning environment.



EXPANSION WITH TALEEMABAD

Moawin Foundation has been actively advancing e-learning by collaborating with Taleemabad to integrate digital educational content across 59 schools in Sheikhpura, P.D. Khan, PSP Ghotki, Ubauro, FAS Karachi, and Gilgit-Baltistan. This initiative has empowered 250 teachers with structured digital resources, enabling them to deliver more effective lessons while enhancing students' comprehension and retention.



E-LEARNING

ECCE CERTIFICATION FROM PAFEC

Moawin Foundation, in collaboration with Pakistan Alliance for Early Childhood (PAFEC), sponsored the certification of 50 female ECCE teachers across various regions. Through a 14-week online course, these educators gained vital skills and knowledge, significantly improving their ability to deliver high-quality early childhood education.

This intervention is set to benefit over 1,000 students in our ECCE classes, promote the comprehensive development of young students in their schools and communities.



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TEACHER TRAINING

STRATEGIC PARTNERSHIP WITH KIRAN FOUNDATION

As part of its strategic partnership with Kiran Foundation, Moawin Foundation staff participated in the 20-day "Kiran Ibtedai Culture Training Program" for ECCE teachers. The training focused on creating a positive learning environment, integrating parental education, and understanding early childhood development.

Key areas included respecting children, the role of mothers in schools, and the impact of trauma on young learners. This initiative equipped MF teachers with essential skills to cultivate a nurturing and student-centred educational experience.



EMPOWERING MF TEACHERS THROUGH AMERICAN BOARD TRAINING PROGRAM

In partnership with the American Board for Certification of Teacher Excellence, Moawin Foundation has conducted an 8-days Professional Teaching Knowledge course for 30 female teachers from 19 schools in Sheikhpura. This initiative is benefitting approximately 5,000 students by equipping teachers with advanced instructional strategies and enhancing their teaching expertise.

In the second phase, 9 master trainers have been selected from these trainees to expand the program to other areas, with the phase scheduled to take place in early 2025.



PEDAGOGY TRAINING FOR TEACHERS BY IBA SUKKUR AND SINDH EDUCATION FOUNDATION

At Moawin Foundation, we are dedicated to improving education through continuous professional development for teachers. We believe that equipping teachers with advanced skills is crucial for promoting quality education and empowering future generations. In collaboration with Sindh Education Foundation and IBA Sukkur, one of Pakistan's top institutions, a pedagogy skills training was conducted for 60 teachers from PSP Ghotki and Ubauro, benefiting around 1,500 students.

This initiative is part of our broader mission to enhance teaching quality and create a lasting impact on the students.



INNOVATIVE TEACHER'S TRAINING WITH **ALI INSTITUTE**

Moawin Foundation, in partnership with Ali Institute of Education, Lahore, conducted specialized training on pedagogy and blended learning to enhance teaching effectiveness across its schools.

This initiative equipped approximately 115 teachers with modern instructional strategies, enabling them to integrate innovative teaching methodologies into their classrooms.

By strengthening teachers' capacities, the training has contributed to improved student engagement and learning outcomes across various Moawin Foundation schools.



TEACHER TRAINING WITH FRANKLIN COVEY: "LEADER IN ME" PROGRAM

Moawin Foundation successfully trained 48 teachers from various schools through Franklin Covey's "Leader in Me" program.

This transformative program focuses on personality development, equipping educators with leadership skills that positively impact their teaching methods.

Over 4,000 students are expected to benefit from this initiative, as it inspires both teachers and students to reach their full potential.



EMPOWERING TEACHERS THROUGH DIGITAL & AI TRAINING

Moawin Foundation partnered with Tech Valley to train 29 teachers from 12 different MF-adopted schools on their flagship program, Digital Safar, focusing on safe surfing practices. Additionally, 119 teachers attended training on Gemini AI to enhance lesson planning and the development of Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs).

These initiatives are expected to benefit over 2,000 students by equipping educators with the skills to integrate technology effectively and safely into their teaching practices.


BRIDGING GAPS, TRANSFORMING EDUCATION



- Through skill development, 2,300 individuals are now generating household-level income, creating a profound impact on 14,720 lives. These empowered individuals are not just earning; they are uplifting families, strengthening communities, and driving sustainable change.
- MF has also introduced a fruit processing training unit in GB for the local community to dry Apricot and Mulberry. Altogether 144 women got the training and they are supporting their families by preserving the fruit.

WASH (WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE)



MF remains committed to SDG 6 (Clean Water and Sanitation) by ensuring access to safe drinking water and improved sanitation in schools. MF has installed 3 RO plants, 3200 hand pumps, and upgraded washrooms of 286 schools, creating a healthier learning environment.

These initiatives have reduced waterborne diseases and strengthened hygiene practices among students. Additionally, hygiene awareness sessions were conducted to promote sustainable behavioural change, aligning with global efforts to ensure clean water and sanitation for all.

Over the past decade, MF's WASH interventions have transformed the lives of approximately 580,000 individuals, ensuring access to clean water, improved sanitation, and better hygiene practices.

Report on the audit of financial statements

Opinion



PERFORMANCE REVIEW:

During the reporting period, Moawin Foundation has exhibited outstanding performance, firmly adhering to its core vision of empowering individuals through education and livelihood opportunities. We successfully expanded our impact by adopting 18 additional schools, bringing our total number of adopted schools to 136. This significant growth has considerably enhanced our reach, increasing our collective student enrollment to approximately 36,900.

Of these students, more than 60% are girls, highlighting our commitment to advancing gender equality and providing educational opportunities to underrepresented populations. This expansion not only strengthens our presence but also amplifies our ability to foster educational development and create a supportive learning environment for thousands of students across the region.

In reporting year Moawin Foundation has installed over 150 E-learning units in classrooms, providing interactive and dynamic learning experiences. This initiative is backed by our partnerships with Sabaq Foundation and Taleemabad. We have significantly expanded our Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) setups by establishing 13 new ECCE centers. This expansion increases our total number of ECCE centers to 67. These centers play a crucial role in providing foundational education and nurturing early development for young children.

MF has added 3 new Vocational Training Institutes (VTIs), raising the total to 8 VTIs. This expansion enhances our ability to provide essential skills for sustainable livelihoods. Details of our beneficiaries, categorized by trade, are provided below

In August 2023, third-party evaluation was conducted by CAI on a sample basis in the GB region to assess the quality of program implementation in 19 adopted schools. Additionally, another external assessment and benchmarking exercise is underway for 14 randomly selected adopted schools across MF program regions. The results were very encouraging and appreciated by CAI.

This year, under the Relief and Poverty Alleviation programme, MF and IHHNL successfully executed several impactful projects across various regions of Pakistan. These initiatives included the ongoing support for orphans, installation of over 1,800 water pumps, distribution of sacrificial meat during Qurbani to 9,000 families in Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (KP), Balochistan, and Azad Jammu & Kashmir (AJK). Moreover, supported cataract surgeries for 250 individuals from highly marginalized communities. Together, these efforts have significantly contributed to improving the well-being of vulnerable communities in these areas.

Moawin Foundation believes in the power of collaboration to drive meaningful change for community development. In the reporting year, MF has partnered with several organizations to enhance educational opportunities across Pakistan. The Chinese Consul

General in Lahore added two classrooms to GBS Mamunwali in Sheikhpura, while Franklin Covey delivered Leader in Me (LiM) training at schools in Ghotki and Ubauro. TIKA explored our proposals for a vocational training institute in Attock and a fruit dehydration project in Gilgit-Baltistan, complementing ongoing collaboration with the Aga Khan Development Network (AKDN). Federal Directorate of Education (FDE) signed an LoU for the adoption of 13 schools. Furthermore, the CEO of the District Education Authority (DEA) Jhelum signed an MoU six school's adoption. Whereas, OGDCL supported school adoptions in Shujabad and considered a project in Shakardara, Kohat. The Special Communications Organization (SCO) contributed by providing S-Paisa and IT training in Gilgit-Baltistan, while GBTI supported us in adoption of 14 schools through an MoU. Moreover, an MoU with the American Board for teachers' training and certification underscored the importance of professional development, further advancing efforts to elevate education standards nationwide.

PRINCIPAL RISKS AND UNCERTAINTIES:

For the current year Board has raised donations of Rs. 546 million, that were adequate to run the operations of Moawin Foundation. The diversification in resources has helped Moawin Foundation increase its outreach, it reflects the confidence posed by the donors. The management has adopted global best practices that has ensured transparency in Financial Management Systems of the organization. The current activities are funded by individual as well as institutional donors. There are no major risks or uncertainties facing Moawin Foundation.

Auditors

Present statutory auditor M/s Grant Thornton Anjum Rahman, Chartered Accountants have completed audit for the year ended 30 June 2024 and shall retire on the conclusion of 10th Annual General Meeting. Being eligible, they offered themselves to be re-appointed. The Board considered and recommended their re-appointment for the Financial Year ending June 30, 2025.


